

Inclusive strategies for the autism spectrum

Overview

With the majority of children and adolescents on the spectrum now attending inclusive education environments, it is essential to be aware of the challenges these complex environments can create for this group of learners.

This module aims to support educators, parents/carers, specialist and support staff in developing and demonstrating their understanding of the profiles and needs of children and adolescents on the autism spectrum in order for appropriate adjustments and supports to be put in place.
