ELLC's training module **Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander Peoples and end of life law** focuses on end of life decision-making with First Nations Peoples, families, and communities.

The module can support health professionals to:


- understand legal considerations when caring for Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander Peoples, their families, and communities at the end of life, and
- deliver high-quality, Culturally Safe and Culturally Responsive care.

It can also support health services and organisations to meet the National Safety and Quality Health Care Standards relevant to care for Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander Peoples:

- Clinical Governance (Standard 1)
- Partnering with Consumers (Standard 2)
- Comprehensive Care (Standard 5).
